



# Seventh Annual Puerto Rico Tip-Off

November 21, 22 and 24, 2013

ESPN Regional Television, Inc., a subsidiary of ESPN, will stage the seventh annual **Puerto Rico Tip-Off** November 21, 22 and 24. The 12-game, bracketed collegiate basketball event will be played in San Juan at the Coliseo Roberto Clemente. The 2013 **Puerto Rico Tip-Off** features eight schools that participated in the 2013 post-season. **Georgetown** (BIG EAST), **Kansas State** (Big 12) **Michigan** (Big Ten) and **VCU** (Atlantic 10) competed in the NCAA Championships. The Wolverines advanced to the championship game where Michigan lost to Louisville 82-76. **Michigan** joins **Memphis** (2008), **Villanova** (2009) and **West Virginia** (2010) as schools entering a Puerto Rico Tip-Off after participating in college basketball's showcase event, the "Final Four". **Charlotte** (Conference USA), **Florida State** (Atlantic Coast), **Long Beach State** (Big West) and **Northeastern** (Colonial Athletic) competed in the NIT. **VCU** competed in the inaugural **Puerto Rico Tip-Off** in 2007 and won one of three games to place fourth. **Kansas State** will be competing in its second **Puerto Rico Tip-Off** after placing third in the 2009 event by winning two of three games.

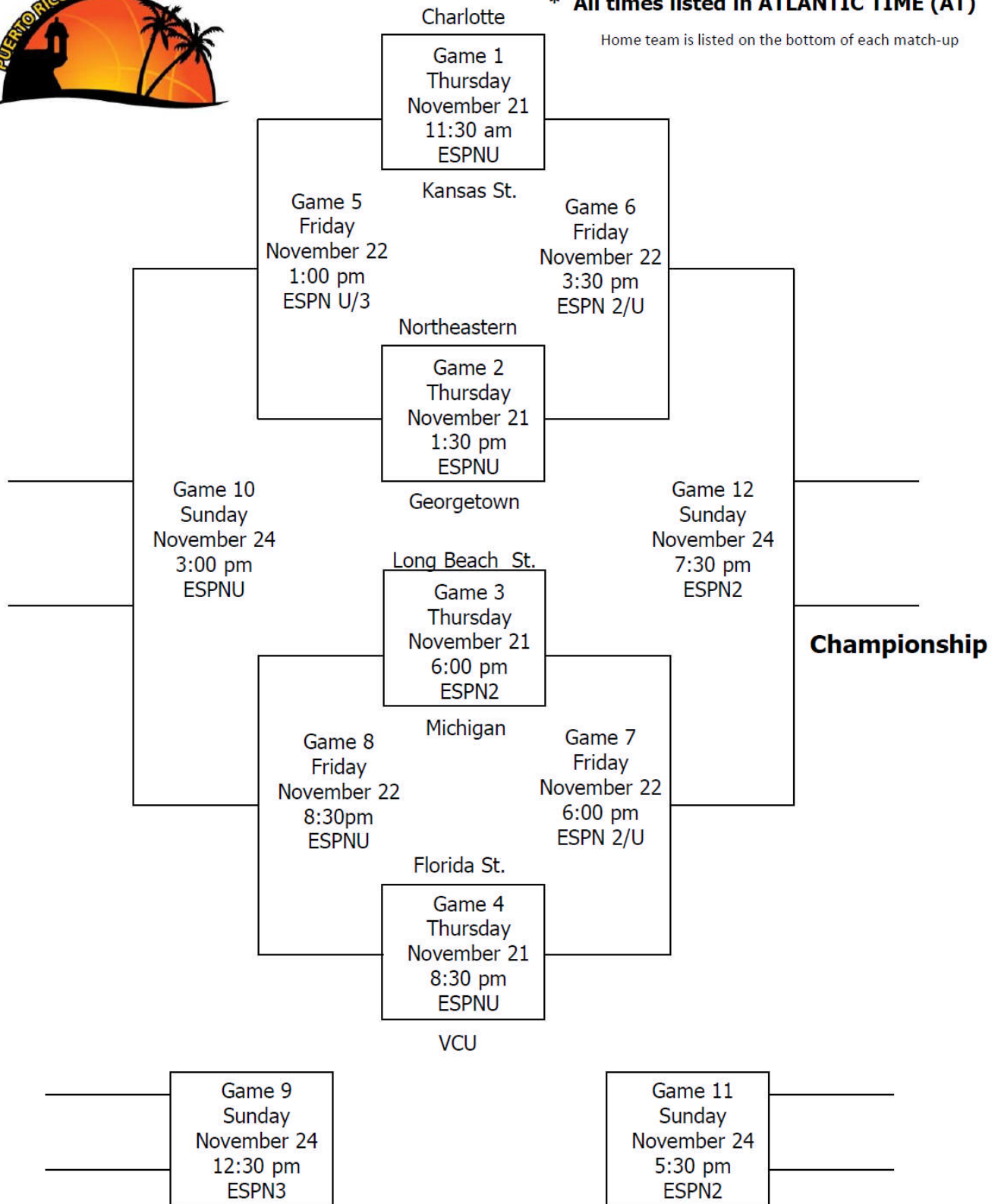

## 2013 PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF - SCHOOL PREVIEWS

**CHARLOTTE** - After eight years in the Atlantic 10 Conference, junior guard **Pierriá Henry** will lead the 49ers return to Conference USA where the school competed for 10 years (1995-1996 through 2004-2005). With four starters returning from a 21-11 team that competed in the NIT post-season tournament, the 6-4 Henry does a little bit of everything for his team (10.3 points per game, 5.5 rebounds, 3.7 assists and 2.5 steals). Despite not having a dominated rebounder last season, the 49ers ranked 45th national with Henry and 6-7 **Willie Clayton** (8.5 points and 6.5 rebounds) the team leaders. With no seniors on the current roster, Charlotte will still be young and adjusting to a new conference will be a challenge. Guard **Ivan Benkovic** is a 40% 3-point shooter after playing about 10 minutes a game last season and 6-10 **Mike Thorne** is an untested sophomore center seeking an expanded role this season. **Cameron Blakely** will get significant minutes as Coach **Alan Major**, who is starting his fourth season leading the 49ers, feels that the 6-7 freshman "brings a unique combination of size and skill to our team." Graduate student **Ben Cherry**, a Charlotte prep product, will provide experience after he saw action in 34 games for Tulane last season and averaged 4.4 points per game while shooting 50% from beyond the arc (34 for 68).

**Florida State** - After winning the 2012 Atlantic Coast Conference title, Coach Leonard Hamilton feels his young team will be better for the 2013-2014 season as injuries and slower than expected development caused them to miss out on the NCAA Tourney for the first time since 2009. With four starters returning Florida State will benefit from the play of seniors 6-8 forward **Okaro White** (12.4 points and 5.9 rebounds per game), 7-0 center **Kiel Turpin** (5.4 points and 3.0 rebounds) and 6-3 guard **Ian Miller** (5.3 points) not to mention all the experience gained by sophomore guards 6-3 **Devon Bookert** (6.5 points and 2.4 assists) and 6-5 **Aaron Thomas** (6.0 points) last season. The recruiting class brings in a top 30 combo-guard in 6-4 **Xavier Rathan-Mayes** and a shot blocking athlete in 6-9 **Jarquez Smith**. Hamilton will be entering his 12th season at Florida State and could record his 400th collegiate coaching win in Puerto Rico.

**Georgetown** - Coach **John Thompson III**, who has guided the Hoyas to the NCAA championships in each of his nine seasons with the school, must replace Otto Porter, one of the most versatile and productive players in the nation last season and the third pick in the 2013 National Basketball Association draft. The backcourt of 6-2 senior **Markel Starks** (12.8 points and 3.0 assists per game) and 6-3 sophomore **D'Vauntes Smith-Rivera** (8.9 points) should be explosive. Senior 6-8 forward **Nate Lubick** (7.1 points and a 59%-plus shooter from the field) has continued to make progress. The status of 6-8 junior forward **Greg Whittington** is uncertain as he tore an ACL in June.

**Kansas State** - Coach Bruce Weber starts his second season in the "Little Apple" after leading the Wildcats to a 27-8 record and the school's fourth-straight appearance in the NCAA Championships. Kansas State returns starting guards 6-6 **Shane Southwell** (8.4 points and 2.5 assists per game, All-Big 12 honorable mention selection) and 6-2 **Will Spradling** (7.4 points and 2.5 assists). Other key players for K-State with experience as starters are forwards 6-7 junior **Thomas Gipson** (7.9 points and 5.0 rebounds) and 6-5 **Nino Williams** (4.2 points and 3.3 rebounds). The Wildcats added seven new players, including five freshman and two Division I transfers that will sit out the 2013-2014 campaign.

**Long Beach State** - The 49ers continue to play one of the nation's best non-league schedules (eight NCAA 2013 participants on the schedule) as Coach **Dan Monson** returns two starters from the 2012-2013 Big West Championship team as he looks to 6-0 guard **Mike Caffey** (12.0 points, 4.0 rebounds and 3.8 assists per game) and 6-9 forward **Dan Jennings** (8.4 points and 6.4 rebounds) to lead the team this coming season. The 49ers, who will be seeking their fourth consecutive conference crown, will also have to rely on newcomers to support Caffey and Jennings. Monson is entering his seventh season at Long Beach State and has amassed 104 wins to rank third all-time in wins at the school trailing only Hall of Famer **Jerry Tarkanian** (122).

**Michigan** - Despite the departure of two "early" NBA draftees - Trey Burke (Utah Jazz) and Tim Hardaway, Jr. (New York Knicks), there is still a competitive team in Ann Arbor with eight letter winners return from last season's Final Four team. U-M will be led by **Mitch McGary** (7.5 points and 6.3 rebounds per game), **Glenn Robinson III** (11.0 points and 5.4 rebounds), **Nik Stauskas** (11.0 points, 44.0 percent 3-point shooter), **Spike Albrecht** (totaled a career-best 17 points in a career-high 28 minutes on 6-for-9 shooting in the NCAA title game), **Jordan Morgan** (4.6 points and 4.3 rebounds), **Jon Horford** and **Max Bielfeldt**. While Stauskas, Robinson III and Jordan were regular starters last season, McGary was a major factor in Michigan's advancement to the NCAA title game as he started all six post-season games where he averaged 14.3 points and 10.7 rebounds a game while shooting 67.8 percent from the field (40-for-59). Coach **John Beilein**, who is starting his eighth season at Michigan, also added another "gifted" recruiting class featuring **Zak Irvin** (Indiana's 2013 Mr. Basketball), **Derrick Walton Jr.** and **Mark Donnal**.

**Northeastern** - Coming off a 20-win season, a Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) regular season title and an NIT appearance, the cupboard is not bare for **Bill Coen** as he starts his eighth season with the Huskies. Junior forwards 6-8 **Quincy Ford**, an All-CAA selection, and 6-7 **Reggie Spencer** finished with 12.2 and 9.8 points per contest, respectively, with each tacking on nearly six rebounds per game. Sophomore 6-2 guard **Demetrius Pollard** developed into an important contributor, earning nearly 16 minutes of action per game while coming up with some clutch performances against UNC Wilmington (17 points), Georgia State (15) and George Mason (13) in the CAA tournament. Sophomore 6-6 guard **David Walker**, who emerged as a starter early last season averaged 6.2 points and 2.4 assists per game and added 42 steals to earn CAA All-Rookie honors.

**VCU** - The Rams are no longer coming in under the radar as the school rewarded Coach **Shaka Smart** with a long-term extension. Smart's fifth VCU will return an overwhelming majority of last season's production along with adding 6-8 forward **Terrance Shannon**, who graduated last spring from Florida State. Shannon was the Seminoles' third-leading scorer (7.9 points per game), second-leading rebounder (5.9) and led the team in steals per game with 1.2. Shannon fortifies a VCU frontcourt that includes All-Atlantic 10 selection **Juvonte Reddic**, rising junior **Jarred Guest**, red-shirt freshmen **Mo Alie-Cox** and incoming recruit **Antravious Simmons**. Junior **Treveon Graham** returns as VCU top scorer last season as the 6-5 guard averaged 15.2 points a game while finish second to Reddic in rebounding (5.9 per game.). A 6-9 senior forward Reddic averaged 14.6 points and 8.2 rebounds per game. Paced by 6-2 junior guard **Briante Weber**, VCU led the nation last season in steals per game (11.7) and turnover margin (plus-8.0). The Rams "loudest and most energetic player," Weber was sixth nationally in steals (2.7 per game) last season.

## 2013 PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF - COACHES & COMMENTS

**ALAN MAJOR** starts his fourth season in Charlotte as his 49ers have improved their overall and conference wins totals in each of his three seasons at the school. Season three of the Major era featured the 49ers winning the Great Alaska Shootout title and setting a school-record for best start at 9-0. Highlighted by a win at then-No. 10 Butler, the 49ers won 21 games which marked the program's first 20-win season since 2007-2008 campaign. Major, who has a 44-49 record at Charlotte, also guided the 49ers last season to their first postseason tournament since 2008 with an NIT appearance. Prior to be named the 49er coach on March 15, 2010, Major was an assistant for Thad Matta at at Ohio State (six seasons) and Xavier (three seasons). In those nine years, he participated in seven NCAA Tournaments, including three Sweet 16's and one national championship game. Major's 18-seasons as an assistant coach included stints at Pacific, Southern Illinois and Cal Lutheran. A 1992 Purdue graduate, Major served as a manager for Gene Keady's Boilermakers. **MAJOR ON PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF** - "The team is very excited about playing in the Puerto Rico Tipoff. The tournament has a very strong field and we will have a chance to play three quality opponents. We are also looking forward to visiting and sightseeing in Puerto Rico."



**LEONARD HAMILTON'S** incredible list of accomplishments at Florida State has solidified him as one of the top coaches of the last 40 years in college basketball as he has put together nine 20-win seasons in the last 13 years, taken nine of his 11 teams at Seminole squads to the postseason and cemented the school as the third winningest program in the ACC since the start of the 2005-2006 season. Hamilton has a 219-143 record at FSU and has posted a 419-353 record in 25 seasons of being a head coach, including stints at Oklahoma State (1986-1990) and Miami (1990-2000). He is poised to become the Seminoles' all-time winningest coach and enters the 2013-2014 season ranked 12th in the illustrious history of the ACC in career victories. Hamilton has earned three National Coach of the Year awards, two ACC Coach of the Year award, two Big East Coach of the Year awards, led his teams to seven NCAA Tournament appearances and 16 postseason appearances. He is the only person to earn Coach of the Year honors in both the ACC and the Big East. Hamilton led the Seminoles to the first ACC basketball championship in school history in 2012 (a feat that was thought to be unthinkable before Hamilton's arrival in Tallahassee). Since the start of the 2005-2006 season (the last eight years) the Seminoles rank third in the ACC in overall wins (174), third in the ACC in regular season wins (75) and ACC regular season and ACC Tournament wins (83). The Seminoles have won at least 22 games and at least 10 ACC regular season games in four of the last five seasons. With their 3-0 record in the 2012 ACC Tournament, the Seminoles won a single season school record 15 ACC games. **HAMILTON ON PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF** - "We feel very privileged to have the opportunity to play in the 2013 Puerto Rico Tip-Off. The field is one of the top collections of teams of all of the early season tournaments and is the highlight of our pre-ACC schedule. The opportunity to play any of the teams in this event will serve us well as we look forward to our ACC schedule in January."



**JOHN THOMPSON III** was introduced as Georgetown's 17th Head Coach on April 20, 2004 and in nine seasons in the nation's capital, he has guided the Hoyas to nine post-season appearances and a 209-88 record (70.4%). Thompson III's Georgetown teams have been selected to the NCAA Tournament seven times with a "Sweet 16" appearance in 2006 and a "Final Four" berth in 2007. The son of a coaching legend (John Jr.), Thompson III has also led the Hoyas to the 2007 Big East Tournament Championship and three regular titles (2007, 2008 and 2013). He has led the Hoyas to three appearances in the BIG EAST Tournament Championship game in nine years. He was named the 2007 National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Coach of the Year. Thompson III guided Princeton to three Ivy League Championships (2001, 2002 and 2004), two NCAA tournaments (2001 and 2004) and an NIT appearance (2002) over his four years as head coach. Combined with his 68-42 Princeton mark, Thompson II has a 13-season coaching mark of 277-130 (68/1%). Prior to playing basketball at Princeton where he ranks among the Tigers' career assist leaders (358) and was the team's most valuable player in 1988, Thompson III was a 1984 All-Metro performer at Gonzaga College High in Washington, D.C. **THOMPSON III ON PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF** - "TBD"



**BRUCE WEBER** will be starting his second season at Kansas State after coaching the Wildcats to a share of the Big 12 title and an appearance in the NCAA Championships. The 27 wins and 14 league victories by the 2012-2013 Wildcats were the most by a first-year head coach in school history as Weber became just the second first-year head coach to win a league title and the first since Zora Clevenger (1916-17) won the Missouri Valley Conference. Weber was also one of three coaches to win the league title in his first season since the inception of the Big 12 in 1997 as the 27 wins were the third-most by a first-year head coach in Big 12 history. Weber was the Big 12 Coach of the Year by the league coaches and The Associated Press, the NABC All-District 8 Coach of the Year and U.S. Basketball Writers Association (USBWA) All-District VI Coach of the Year. Weber has compiled a 340-163 (67.6%) in his 15 seasons as a head coach, which includes stints at Southern Illinois (1998-2003) and Illinois (2003-11). Weber's teams have participated in postseason play in 11 of his 15 seasons, including nine NCAA Tournament appearances. He has won 11 NCAA Tournament games, including trips to the Sweet 16 in 2002, 2004 and 2005, while his 2004-05 Illinois squad played North Carolina ranks 28th among active Division I head coaches, while he is the 41st coach (21st active coach) in NCAA history to take three different schools to the NCAA Tournament for the NCAA Championship. **WEBER ON PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF** - "The Puerto Rico Tip-Off has emerged as one of the top preseason tournaments in college basketball at one of the top destinations. This year's field is impressive with national runner-up Michigan plus every team in the field advanced to postseason a year ago. It will be a great test for our young team."



## 2013 PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF - COACHES & COMMENTS

**DAN MONSON** is entering his seventh season as head coach at Long Beach State, having amassed a record of 104-91 during his tenure. He ranks third all-time in wins at LBSU, trailing only Seth Greenberg (104-70) and the Hall of Famer Jerry Tarkanian (122-20), and needs just 17 wins to move into a tie for the No. 1 spot. Monson has been named the Big West Coach of the Year in each of the last three seasons as he guided the 49ers to three consecutive Big West regular season crowns and berths in post-season tournaments. The son of former Idaho and Oregon head coach Don Monson, Dan has compiled a 274-214 (56.1%) in his 16 seasons as a head coach, which includes stints at Gonzaga (1997-1999) and Illinois (1999-2007). Dan Monson's teams have participated in postseason play in 10 of his 16 seasons, including three NCAA Tournament appearances and seven NIT berths. His 2003 Minnesota team advanced to the NIT semi-finals in New York. An Oregon high school coach for a season, Dan Monson was a graduate assistant under Gene Bartow at UAB (1986-1988) before becoming an assistant coach Gonzaga (1988-97). He became Gonzaga's head coach in March 1997 at the age of 36.

**MONSON ON PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF** - "We pride ourselves every year in challenging ourselves in a major pre-season tournament - and we certainly have done that this year. This field is extremely strong, and we are excited and honored to be a part of it. We know that we will leave Puerto Rico as a better basketball team after playing such a quality event."



**JOHN BEILEIN** enters his 36th season as a collegiate head coach, and his seventh at Michigan, with 673 career wins and fresh off his first appearance in the Final Four. Beilein's first Final Four appearance came while guiding the Wolverines to a school-record tying 31 wins in 2012-13, defeating Syracuse in the National Semifinals before falling to Louisville in the National Championship game. In his first six seasons at U-M, Beilein has led the Wolverines to 122 victories, four NCAA Tournament appearances and the school's first Big Ten championship since 1986. Considered to be one of the best tactical basketball minds in the country, Beilein has posted winning records in 30 of his 35 seasons as a collegiate head coach, including 18 20-win seasons. He is one of just nine coaches to have taken four different Division I programs to the NCAA Tournament, making appearances in the "Big Dance" at all four of his Division I stops (Canisius, Richmond, West Virginia and Michigan). Beilein also guided LeMoyne to the NCAA Division II Tournament, giving him nine total NCAA Tournament appearances during his collegiate coaching career. Beilein enters the 2013-14 season ranked sixth among active Division I coaches in career victories.

**BEILEIN ON PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF** - "The Puerto Rico Tip-Off is another classic preseason tournament, like the Maui Invitational and Alaska. It affords us the opportunity to play in the same time zone, play on a beautiful island and to play really good basketball teams before Thanksgiving."



**BILL COEN**, entering his eighth season as head coach at Northeastern, continues to lead a basketball renaissance on Boston's Huntington Avenue. Last season, Coen guided Northeastern to the program's first Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) regular-season championship, behind a 20-13 (14-4 CAA) record. The Huskies advanced to the CAA tournament championship game for the first time and earned a berth in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) - their second in four seasons and third postseason appearance in the last five years. Coen led the Huskies to the nation's fourth-best regular-season road record (10-2), and his squad owned an impressive 13-4 record in games decided by five points or less. The Huskies tied school records for most overtime games played and won at 4-1. He received high praise for the Huskies' success, earning National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) District 10 Co-Coach of the Year and U.S. Basketball Writers Association (USBWA) District I Coach of the Year honors, and also was named a finalist for the Hugh Durham National Coach of the Year Award. Coen is widely regarded for his ability to evaluate and develop talented players. In his seven seasons at Northeastern, NU players have earned 17 All-CAA honors, including five First Team and five All-Rookie selections. Eight of Coen's players are currently playing professional basketball. Coen has amassed 111 career wins in seven seasons at Northeastern and ranks eighth on the CAA's list of all-time winningest coaches with 78 wins in conference play.

**COEN ON PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF** - "The Puerto Rico Tip-Off is one of the premier early-season events in college basketball. We're excited about this year's field and look forward to competing against some of the nation's elite programs. This trip also provides us the opportunity to expose our team to the rich history, culture and natural beauty of Puerto Rico."



**SHAKA SMART'S** four-season tenure at VCU has features an 111-37 (75.0%) record, four seasons of 27 or more wins, three NCAA appearances highlighted by a "final four" berth in 2011 and a 2010 College Basketball Insider title. The "remarkable" run by Smart's 2011 VCU squad to the "final four" featured upset wins over USC, Georgetown, Purdue, Florida State and Kansas before losing 70-62 to Butler in the national semi-finals. Smart was introduced as VCU's 10th head coach on April 2, 2009, and two years to the day later, he was coaching the 11th-seeded Rams in a "final four" matchup with Butler. ## 2013 PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF PARTICIPANTS - IN-SEASON TOURNAMENT PARTICIPATION

**CHARLOTTE IN-SEASON TOURNAMENT NOTES** - Charlotte has appeared in 57 in-season tournament with 17 titles and a 63-48 (56.48%) mark. The 49ers captured the 2012 Great Alaska Shootout by defeating Northeastern 67-59 in the championship game. Charlotte went 1-2 at the 2007 Paradise Jam in St. Thomas, US Virgin Islands.

**FLORIDA STATE IN-SEASON TOURNAMENT NOTES** - The 2013 Puerto Rico Tip-Off will be Florida State's third in-season tournament appearance off the mainland and the first in the Carribean. The Seminoles completed in the Great Alaska Shootout in 1989 and 2000. FSU has competed in 66 in-season tournaments with a 92-35 record (72.4%) and 15 titles since winning the title at the 1962 Savannah Invitational. The Seminoles captured the 2012 Coaches Vs. Cancer Championship as FSU scored a 73-66 win over Saint Joseph's in the title game at the Barclays Center in Brooklyn, N.Y. It marked the third time in the last five seasons that the Seminoles played for the championship of an in-season tournament. Florida State won the 2008 in the Las Vegas Global Sports Classic and captured the 2009 Old Spice Classic in Orlando while placing third at the 2010 Hawaiian Airlines Diamond Head Classic.

**GEORGETOWN IN-SEASON TOURNAMENT NOTES** - Georgetown last played in Puerto Rico in 1985, beating Tennessee and North Carolina A&T. During John Thompson III's tenure at Georgetown, the Hoyas have completed in six in-season tournaments with a 12-4 record and two tournament titles. Georgetown won the 2005 Sun Bowl Tournament in El Paso and the 2010 Charleston Classic by defeating North Carolina State 82-67 in the finals. Last season, the Hoyas finished second in the Legends Classic at the Barclays Center in Brooklyn where Georgetown defeated UCLA (78-70) and lost to Indiana 82-72 in the overtime championship game.

**KANSAS STATE'S IN-SEASON TOURNAMENT NOTES** - The Puerto Rico Tip-Off is the 43rd in-season tournament that the Wildcats have participated in since 1935, including the second time in the tournament (2009). Overall, the school is 124-73 (63.1%) in-season tournaments, which includes seven Big Six/Seven/Eight Holiday Tournaments [1947, 1950, 1952, 1958, 1960, 1961 and 1963] and eight other titles (1959 Kansas Tournament, 1987 Sun Met Classic, 1990 BMA Holiday Classic, 1993 Hawai'i Nike Festival, 1994 Capital City Classic, 1995 Otis Spunkmeyer Classic, 2007 Las Vegas Holiday Classic and 2011 Hawaiian Airlines Diamond Head Classic).

**LONG BEACH STATE'S IN-SEASON TOURNAMENT NOTES** - Long Beach State last won an in-season tournament during the 1992-1993 season when the 49ers went 2-0 in both the Hawai'i Tip Off Tournament and the Fresno State Coors Light Tournament. Under Coach Dan Monson since the 2007-2008 season, the 49ers have competed in four in-season tournaments with a 6-8 record. Long Beach finished fifth in the 2010 Paradise Jam in St. Thomas, Virgin Islands, before placing second in the 2011 Hawaiian Airlines Diamond Head Classic where the 49ers dropped a 77-60 decision to Kansas State in the finals. The 49ers also played in the 76 Classic during the 2009-2010 season and went 1-2 during the three-day tournament.

**MICHIGAN'S IN-SEASON TOURNAMENT NOTES** - Michigan captured the 2012 NIT Pre-Season title by defeating Kansas State 71-57 in the championship game. Since 2007 under Coach John Beilein, Michigan has 13-8 record in six in-season tournament appearances with one title. Overall, the Wolverines have completed in 55 in-season tournament s with an 84-58 record (59.2%) with 14 championships (including sanctioned games). Michigan played and won three games at the 1997 Puerto Rico Holiday Classic at San Juan's Rico Eugene Guerra Sports Complex.

**NORTHEASTERN'S IN-SEASON TOURNAMENT NOTES** - The Huskies will be making their second appearance in Puerto Rico after winning two of three games at the 2002 San Juan Shootout. Under Coach Bill Coen, Northeastern has competed in seven in-season tournaments with an 8-10 record. The Huskies placed second in the 2012 Great Alaska Shootout after losing 67-59 to Charlotte in the championship game. Northeastern has completed in 60 in-season tournaments with 10 titles and a 64-69 record (48.1%). Northeastern's last in-season tournament title was in 2009 at the Cable Car Classic in Santa Clara, Calif.

**VCU'S IN-SEASON TOURNAMENT NOTES** - VCU has competed in 52 regular-season tournaments, capturing nine titles while compiling a record of 63-58 (52.1%). The Rams captured the 1987 San Juan Shootout by defeating Puerto Rico-Cayey (99-74) and Arkansas State (77-68) for their last in-season title.
